


COUNCIL QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Meeting date: May 3rd

1. In regard to the pedestrian bridge that is being contemplated for the Selkirk Street Stormwater Outfall project, how will the next stages be communicated to the public?

The dimensions of the bridge are approximately 3.5m wide, 16m long, and 2m above the bottom of swale.

The engineering design drawings indicate the approximate route of the temporary trail detour during construction and it will be a condition of the construction contract for the contractor to maintain access during construction as much as possible. There may be very short periods where the trail is closed, for example when the bridge is being installed. This will be the responsibility of the contractor to communicate this to the public and both the Government of Yukon (YG) and the City can help spread that communication when the time comes.



The next steps for communicating the project will be for YG to place large project information signage on site shortly, along with their federal funding signage that will be robust enough to withstand the elements for the duration of the project.

Once the project information signage is completed, the City will advertise the project information on our social media channels to reach a larger audience.

During construction:

- YG will lead communications (with the Department of Education) in relation to construction activities adjacent the school;
- YG will lead communications, with City input, in relation to construction activities
 within the intersection of Alsek/Lewes. It is anticipated that there will be partial
 lane closures and periodic detours during construction. City social media and
 public service announcements will be utilized to communicate to a larger
 audience:
- YG will lead communications, with City input, in relation to construction activities
 that will impact the Millennium Trail. City social media and public service
 announcements will be utilized to communicate to a larger audience.

2. Can you provide the housing stats for Whitehorse since 2018?

3. When will the remediation project on 6th Avenue be completed?

With respect to 6th Ave Remediation, further environmental investigation is required prior to developing the plan of remediation for this area. Additional on-site drilling is expected to happen in early June, with the delivery of a final remediation plan by early August. Depending on the amount of work involved in the remediation, development on the site could commence as early as the summer of 2022, subject to an approved development plan being established for the area. If more intensive remediation work is determined to be necessary through the results of the on-site soil testing and monitoring well sampling, development of the site could be deferred out to the summer of 2023.
