1. Re-Budgeting Capital Expenditures

As in previous budget cycles, some Capital Projects budgeted for the 2022 budget fiscal year were not fully completed. Administration has reviewed outstanding Capital Projects and identified those that require re-budgeting. For these projects to be completed, expenditures authorized in 2022 must be re-budgeted into 2023 by amending the Capital Expenditure Program Bylaw.

Administration responded to questions about specific projects regarding timelines, budgets and details regarding the listed projects.

The Recommendation of the Corporate Services Committee is

THAT Council direct that Bylaw 2023-13, a bylaw to amend the 2023 to 2026 Capital Expenditure Program by re-budgeting 2022 Capital Expenditures in the amount of \$40,826,094, be brought forward for consideration under the bylaw process.

2. Budget Amendment COVID Wasterwater Testing

The Committee was presented with a request to amend the 2023 Operating Budget to accommodate a funding contribution in the amount of \$150,000 for a Wastewater Surveillance COVID-19 Project. The City entered into an agreement with the Council of Yukon First Nations to receive funding for the coordination, sampling and shipment of raw wastewater samples for COVID-19 virus particles analysis as part of a Health Canada project.

The Recommendation of the Corporate Services Committee is

THAT Council amend the 2023 Operating Budget to receive the \$150,000 contribution from the Council of Yukon First Nations, and coordinate the sample collection.

3. New Business – MSB Building Update

A Committee member requested an update regarding the future of the Municipal Services Building. Administration confirmed that the building is a surplus to the needs of the City of Whitehorse and that Administration will be bringing forward a request to dispose of the property.

1. <u>Public Hearing Report – Zoning Amendment 10 Finch Crescent</u>

The Committee was presented with a Public Hearing Report on a bylaw to amend the Zoning at 10 Finch Crescent. A Public Hearing was held on February 27, 2023. One written submission was received in support of the zoning amendment and one individual spoke in support at the Public Hearing. The owner of 10 Finch Crescent has applied to rezone their property from RR – Restricted Residential Detached to RRx – Restricted Residential Detached (modified) to allow a one storey ground level living suite as a secondary use and increase the maximum site coverage from 35% to 40%. The increase in the maximum site coverage is to accommodate the single storey living suite on the ground level so that it is accessible to facilitate aging in place.

The Recommendation of the City Planning Committee is

THAT Council direct that Bylaw 2023-01, a bylaw to amend the zoning of 10 Finch Crescent, to allow a one-storey ground level living suite as a secondary use, and to increase the maximum site coverage to 40%, be brought forward for Second and Third Reading under the bylaw process.

Bylaw 2023-11, a bylaw to amend the zoning of a portion of Lots 55 & 355, located in the Mount Sima Industrial Subdivision, from FP – Future Planning to IS – Industrial Service and PG – Greenbelt.

The City received an application to rezone a portion of Lots 55 & 355, located in the Mount Sima Industrial Subdivision, from FP – Future Planning to IS – Industrial Service and PG – Greenbelt, to enable the release of an approximately 1.41 hectare lot for industrial use.

Bylaw 2023-11 received First Reading on February 27, 2023. Notices were published in the Whitehorse Star and Yukon News on March 3 and 10, 2023. RE: Housing Development Incentive Options – Safe At Home Project

ISSUE

Consideration of housing development incentive options for a supportive housing project being developed by the Safe at Home Society (the Safe at Home Project).

REFERENCE

- Housing Development Incentives Policy
- City Grant-making Policy
- Location Sketch (Appendix A)

HISTORY

On February 6, Council reviewed an application for housing development incentives from the Non-Profit organization Safe At Home Society (SAHS). At that time, SAHS had requested the following incentives under the Housing Development Incentives Policy:

- Rental and Supportive Housing Development Incentive 100% reduction of Development Cost Charges (DCCs) and a ten year tax grant, based on any increased assessment value due to new construction; and
- Non-Profit or Non-Governmental Organization Incentive Council consideration of a cash grant to support an eligible project.

The value of the cash grant requested by SAHS was \$1,735,524, which is broken down as follows:

- anticipated municipal taxes over a ten year term (\$1,408,724);
- permitting and inspection fees (\$213,000)
- utility charges for 2022/23 (\$25,000)
- outstanding taxes (\$69,212) and interest/penalties (\$7,587)
- outstanding utilities (\$10,266) and interest/penalties (\$1,735).

The Administrative Recommendation was to approve the Rental and Supportive Housing incentive that includes reduction of DCCs valued at \$120,000, and a ten year tax grant, based on any increased assessment value due to new construction. The recommendation also included a Non-Profit or Non-Governmental Incentive "cash grant" of \$20,000. At the February 13, 2023 Council Meeting, Administration was requested to review options under current policy to determine if there was further assistance that could be provided for the Safe At Home Project.

A Council and Administration Roundtable (CAR) meeting was held March 16, 2023, where Administration provided a review of the Housing Development Incentives Policy and the City Grant-making Policy, as well as options for further supporting the SAHS application.

ALTERNATIVES

- 1. Approve Housing Development Incentives for the Safe at Home Project; or
- 2. Do not approve Housing Development Incentives for the Safe At Home Project.

ANALYSIS

City Grant-making Policy

The City Grant-making Policy states that an organization shall not exceed a total of \$50,000 in grants per year. This Policy also specifies that it is paramount over other policies including the Housing Development Incentive Policy.

Rental and Supportive Housing Incentive

The SAHS application meets the minimum requirement for eligibility for a Rental and Supportive Housing Development Incentive, which requires the provision of a minimum of four units of supportive housing for a period of ten years. Approval of this incentive will result in a reduction of DCCs valued at approximately \$120,000.

Approval of this type of incentive, would also result in a ten year tax grant, equivalent to the difference between the current assessment value and the resulting increase to the assessment value after construction. However, as this is a retrofit of an existing building, the expected increase in assessed value is likely to be negligible. Additionally, this building has been taxed at a commercial rate historically, so a change to a residential mill rate may result in reduction of the overall annual tax levy.

Non-Profit or Non-Governmental Organization Incentive

This incentive category allows Council to consider a cash grant for an amount that it deems necessary to support major rental or supportive housing projects by non-profits and NGOs. Eligibility for a cash grant will consider factors such as project viability, other external funding sources, project budget, and current market conditions.

Per the policy, under this incentive category a grant for development fees may be issued to a maximum of \$20,000. However, Council may award additional cash grants under the policy as desired, to a maximum of \$50,000 annually. This approach has never been previously awarded and has not been considered as part of the administrative recommendation as it is entirely up to Council's discretion.

Summary of Options

There are currently four options for Council to consider under the current policies:

Option 1 – Approve Current Recommendation from Administration

This option would result in SAHS receiving a Rental and Supportive Housing Development Incentive which includes reduced DCCs and a grant for any increase in property taxes if applicable and a Non-Profit or Non-Governmental Organization Incentive resulting in a cash grant of \$20,000.

The value of the tax grant is unknown until such time as renovations are complete and property tax assessments done by YG.

Option 2 – Additional Grants Combined with Option 1

This option would result in Council approving a variation of Option 1 as described in A below, but also providing an additional cash grant (described in B) below) as per the terms of the Incentives and Grant-making Policies.

A) In addition to the \$20,000 cash grant included in Option 1, this option suggests a further cash grant instead of a tax grant. This is to recognize that this project would likely not result in any eligible tax grant as it is a retrofit instead of a new construction.

The value of the total cash grant could be up to \$50,000 annually for ten years, to a maximum of \$380,000 (\$500,000 total value minus the value of the DCC reduction of \$120,000). Payment of this cash grant would begin once occupancy permits were issued for the development.

B) Council could also award an additional cash grant of \$30,000 (on top of the \$20,000 cap for permitting fees) in 2023 to further for the Safe at Home Project.

Options A) and B) together provide a cash grant for a total of \$430,000 over eleven years.

Option 3 – Decline the Incentives

This option would result in the City not offering any further financial assistance reflecting the City's role in SAHS receiving \$5M from the City's Rapid Housing 2.0 funding from the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation. However, the project does meet the eligibility criteria in Council's Housing Development Incentive Policy for incentives.

In addition, the City may choose to continue to advocate for government partners such as Yukon Housing Corporation or the Canadian Mortgage and Housing Corporation to provide further financial assistance.

Option 4 – Amend Existing Policies

Council could decide to refer this application back to Administration and direct that amendments to the Housing Development Incentives and/or Grant-making Policy be brought forward for consideration.

Reviewing and amending these policies could take considerable time to complete (several months or more), which would not provide certainty for the Safe at Home Project, or for other applicants, as they try to advance their projects.

The Motion to be Considered by Council is (requires a mover and seconder)

THAT Council approve the application for a Rental and Supportive Housing Development Incentive which includes reduced Development Cost Charges and a grant for any increase in property taxes if applicable, for the Safe At Home Project with respect to the retrofit of 4051-4th Avenue to provide 55 supportive housing units; and

THAT Council approve the application for a Non-Profit or Non-Governmental Organization Incentive for the Safe At Home Project for the permitting and inspection fees of \$20,000 in the form of a cash grant.

ISSUE

Third Reading of the Official Community Plan following receipt of Ministerial approval for the proposed 2040 Official Community Plan (OCP).

REFERENCE

- 2010 Official Community Plan
- Municipal Act
- Proposed Official Community Plan Adopting Bylaw 2022-40
- Submission of Adoption of Official Community Plan for Approval letter by the Minister of Community Services (March 2023)
- Whitehorse 2040 Proposed Official Community Plan (January 2023)

HISTORY

The OCP guides decision-making for the City by setting the long-term vision, guiding principles, and supporting policies for City growth and services. The OCP is adopted by Council through a bylaw process following robust public engagement.

Bylaw 2022-40, the Official Community Plan Adopting Bylaw received its First Reading on August 8, 2022. In conformance with Section 281(1) of the *Municipal Act*, a Public Hearing was held on September 12, 2022. Following the Public Hearing, the proposed OCP was updated and a second Public Hearing was held on November 28, 2022. Following the second Public Hearing, further changes to the proposed OCP were made, and the OCP Adopting Bylaw received its Second Reading on January 16, 2023.

Following Second Reading, the proposed OCP was sent to the Minister of Community Services for review. Approval of the bylaw to proceed to Third Reading by the Minister, pursuant to section 282 of the *Municipal Act*, was issued on March 20, 2023.

ANALYSIS

The approval letter received by the Minister of Community Services confirmed the contents of the proposed bylaw and plan meet the requirements stated in Section 278 to 284 of the *Municipal Act*.

The approval letter clarifies it is not an expression of the Government of Yukon's approval of, or commitment to, any development noted within the proposed OCP. Nor does it reduce the Government of Yukon's duty to consult with the Kwanlin Dün First

Nation and the Ta'an Kwäch'än Council on this, or any other amendment to the OCP in the future.

If Council does not provide Third Reading to the Bylaw, the 2010 OCP will continue to be used in force.

Next steps

Following adoption of the OCP, Administration will begin work on the studies, bylaws and future projects that the OCP calls for. Most notably, the Zoning Bylaw will require an update to reflect the vision for land use and development in the new OCP.

A bylaw to amend the 2023 to 2026 Capital Expenditure Program Bylaw 2022-41

WHEREAS Section 238 of the *Municipal Act* (R.S.Y. 2002) provides that Council shall by bylaw adopt an Annual Operating Budget and a multi-year Capital Expenditure Program; and

WHEREAS Section 241 of the *Municipal Act* provides that no expenditure shall be made that increases total expenditures above what was approved in the Annual Operating Budget or Capital Budget unless such expenditure is approved by bylaw; and

WHEREAS it is necessary to increase the 2023 to 2026 Capital Expenditure Program to provide for the re-budgeting of the 2022 Capital Projects;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The 2023 to 2026 Capital Expenditure Program is hereby amended by increasing the 2023 Capital Budget in the amount of \$40,896,850 to provide for the re-budgeting of the 2022 Capital Projects, as detailed in Appendix "A" attached hereto and forming part of this bylaw.
- 2. This bylaw shall come into full force and effect upon final passing thereof.

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WHEREAS Section 289 of the *Municipal Act* provides that a zoning bylaw may prohibit, regulate and control the use and development of land and buildings in a Municipality; and

WHEREAS Section 294 of the *Municipal Act* provides for amendment of the Zoning Bylaw; and

WHEREAS it is deemed desirable that the *Whitehorse Zoning Bylaw* be amended to allow for the development of a living suite at Lot 141, Plan 109380 CLSR YT, Logan Subdivision, municipally known as 10 Finch Crescent;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Section 9.14 of Zoning Bylaw 2012-20 is hereby amended by adding a new subsection 9.14.6 c) as follows:
 - "c) Lot 141, Plan 109380 CLSR YT, located at 10 Finch Crescent in the Logan Subdivision, is designated RRx(c) with the special modifications being:
 - (1) A living suite is allowed as a secondary use; and
 - (2) A living suite must be one storey and located on the ground level; and

Notwithstanding Section 9.14.4 c) of this bylaw, the following provision applies:


- (3) The maximum site coverage is 40%."
- 2. The zoning maps attached to and forming part of Zoning Bylaw 2012-20 are hereby amended by changing the zoning of 10 Finch Crescent from RR–Restricted Residential Detached to RRx(c)–Restricted Residential Detached (Modified), as indicated on Attachment 1 and forming part of this bylaw.
- 3. This bylaw shall come into force and effect upon the final passing thereof.

BYLAW 2022-40

A bylaw to adopt a new Official Community Plan

WHEREAS Section 278 of the *Municipal Act* (SY 2016, c.8) provides that a Municipality shall by bylaw adopt an Official Community Plan in accordance with Part 7, Division 1 of the *Act*; and

WHEREAS Section 279 of the *Municipal Act* provides that an Official Community Plan shall address the future development and use of land, the provision of municipal services and facilities, environmental matters, the development of utility and transportation systems, provisions for the regular review of the Official Community Plan and the Zoning Bylaw, and any other matter the Council considers necessary; and

WHEREAS The City of Whitehorse has completed a comprehensive review and rewrite of the 2010 Official Community Plan;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Municipality of the City of Whitehorse, in open meeting assembled, hereby ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. This bylaw shall be cited as "The Official Community Plan Adopting Bylaw".
- 2. The Official Community Plan, named Whitehorse 2040, policy document and its appendices, attached here as Appendix "A", is hereby adopted by this bylaw.
- 3. The 2010 Official Community Plan, including all of its amendments, is hereby repealed by this bylaw.
- 4. The Official Community Plan shall be adopted as at the date that this bylaw comes into full force and effect upon its final passing.
