Council Questions - Standing Committee September 18, 2023

1. Black Street Construction

a. What is the duration of the street occupancy permit for the construction project currently underway on Black Street?

The permit will be active until mid-October.

2. Transit Costs

a. What is the annual cost for the City to provide transit services – Capital and operating?

Below are the approved Operating and Capital Budgets for 2023 and provisionally approved Operating Budget for 2024 and 2025.

3. Lodgepole Lane

a. Has the fire risk been evaluated by Protective and Fire Services, and when was the last assessment of the property?

Fire Services last attended the property in May. An updated assessment of the property is planned for the fall.



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4. Operating Budget Variance – Government Transfers

a. What is the breakdown of government transfers which are the source of higher than anticipated revenue?

Both the comprehensive municipal grant and carbon price rebate are received annually from the Yukon Government.

The comprehensive municipal grant aims to assist the municipalities with meeting service delivery responsibilities. It is calculated based on a multi-factor formula including a base grant amount as well as amounts for community population, taxable properties, capital assets maintenance and a reduction due to a tax base component, among other things. The 2022 and 2023 grants were \$7,970,927 and \$8,529,538 respectively.

The carbon price rebate sees municipalities receive 3.5% of the federal carbon levy that is remitted to Yukon each year, of which the City receives 70.2378%. The rebate is paid annually and covers the period from April 1 to March 31 of the following year, and the 2024/25 amount for the City will not be known until the end of March 2024. The 2022 and 2023 rebates were \$473,894 and \$555,135 respectively. Unless YG provides information prior to the City's budget adoption, the grant and rebate are estimated using actual amounts from the previous year.

The Territorial Operating Grant reflected below represents 2023 unanticipated one-time funding provided to enhance transit while increasing housing sustainability.

5. Marwell Lift Station Pump

a. What is the expected lifespan for the existing pump?

Pumps can last anywhere from 5-10 years depending on the volume of grit, sand, and solids they are exposed to. The existing pump is over 3 years old.
